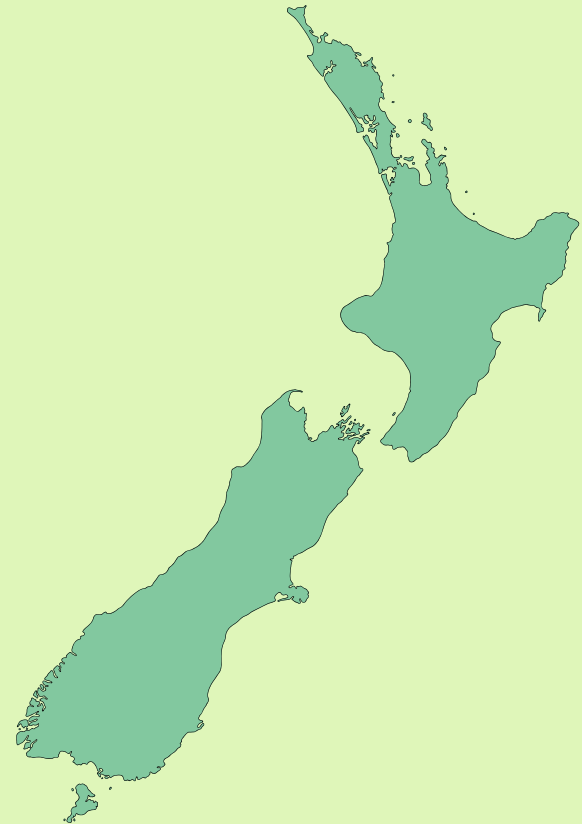


Build Your Own New Zealand Adventure

At each stop, complete a fun challenge to unlock the next destination.

Collect stamps in your Adventure Passport as you go!



New Zealand Adventure

Passport



Sticker Sheet

You have two options to make your stamps ready for your adventure passport:

Option 1: Cut and Stick

1. Carefully cut out the stamp along the edges.
2. Apply sticky glue or double-sided tape to the back of the stamp.
3. Press the stamp onto your passport page and hold for a few seconds so it sticks.
4. Voila! Your stamp is now part of your adventure journey.

Option 2: Print on Sticker Paper

1. Buy sticker paper that works with your printer.
2. Place the sticker paper in your printer following the instructions on the pack.
3. Print the stamps directly onto the sticker paper.
4. Cut out your stamps along the edges.
5. Peel off the backing and stick them directly into your passport.

Landmark 1

Sky Tower (Auckland)

About: The Sky Tower is 328 meters tall. It's the second-tallest free-standing structure in the southern hemisphere by pinnacle height! You can see all of Auckland from its observation deck, and daredevils can try the SkyJump or SkyWalk.

Challenge: Pretend you're a superhero standing on top of the Sky Tower. Draw your superhero pose and write one superpower you'd use to save the city.



Landmark 2

Milford Sound

About: Milford Sound is a beautiful fjord with towering cliffs, waterfalls, and wildlife like 60 bottlenose dolphins, native fur seals, penguins, and blue ducks (whio). It's sometimes called the “eighth wonder of the world.”

Challenge: Imagine you're kayaking in the fjord. Write a short poem or 9-line description of what it feels like to glide through the water surrounded by cliffs.

Landmark 3

Mount Cook / Aoraki (South Island)

About: Aoraki / Mount Cook rises to 3,724 metres and is part of the Southern Alps. It's home to glaciers, rare alpine plants, and unique animals such as the clever Kea parrot, the New Zealand Falcon (Kārearea), and the tiny endangered Rock Wren (Pīwauwau).

Challenge: Design your own hiking trail up Mount Cook. Draw the path and add at least five things you might see along the way as you hike the mountain (like a river, a flower, or a snowy peak).



Landmark 4

Hobbiton (Matamata)

About: Hobbiton is the enchanting movie set of The Lord of the Rings and The Hobbit. It features charming round doors, tiny gardens, and the famous Green Dragon Inn.

Challenge: Create a mini comic strip of a hobbit's day in Hobbiton. Include at least 3 panels and one funny event!



Landmark 5

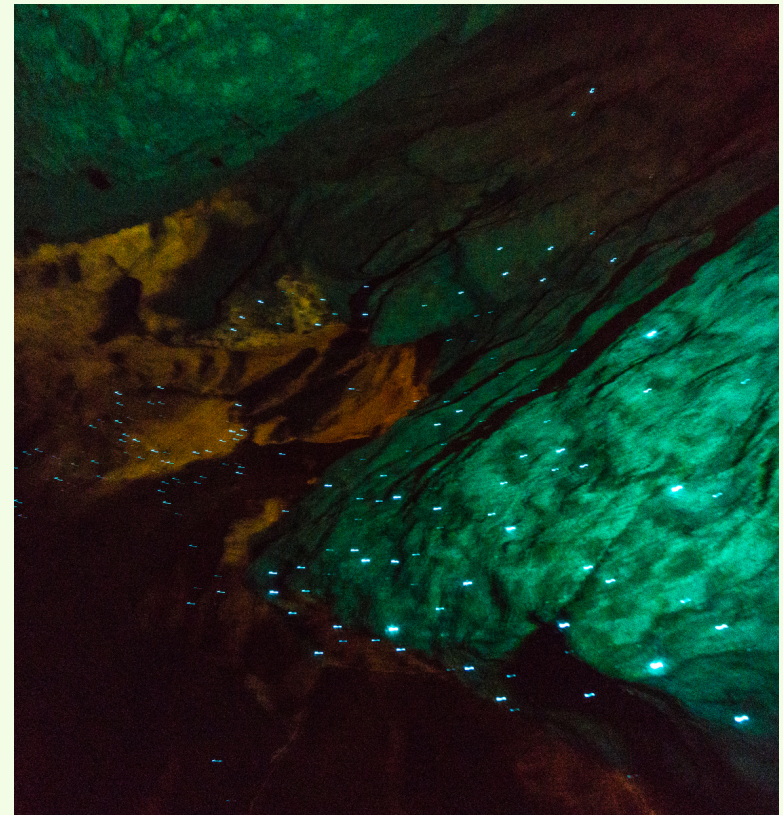
Waitomo Glowworm Caves (Waikato)

About: These 30-million-year-old caves are magical. They're covered in thousands of glowworms that light up like stars in the dark. Boat rides through the caves make it look like floating in a galaxy.

Challenge: Create your own “glowworm galaxy” on paper. Use dots, stars, or glitter to make your galaxy shine, and give it a creative name.

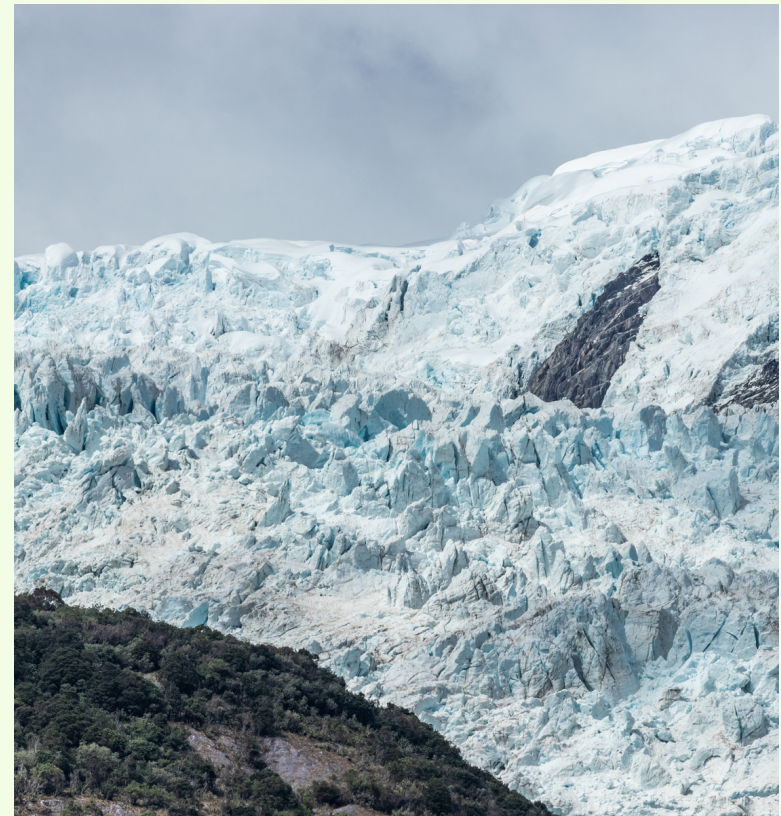


Landmark 6

Franz Josef Glacier (West Coast)

About: Franz Josef Glacier flows down from the Southern Alps into the lush rainforest, making it one of the three glaciers in the world that reaches so close to a temperate forest. It's the fastest-moving and steepest glacier in all of New Zealand. It has been recorded as moving up to 4 metres in one day.

Challenge: Imagine you've discovered a hidden ice creature inside the glacier. Draw the creature and write 2–3 sentences about what it does.



Landmark 7

Te Papa Museum (Wellington)

About: New Zealand's national museum has fascinating exhibits about Māori culture, wildlife, art, and the country's history. Many exhibits are hands-on and interactive.

Challenge: Create a museum exhibit of your own! Draw or write about one thing you'd put in a museum to show the world about your hometown or favorite animal.



Landmark 8

Rotorua Geothermal Area (Bay of Plenty)

About: Rotorua is famous for its bubbling mud pools, steaming geysers, and hot springs! The area sits on a geothermal zone, which means heat from deep underground escapes in spectacular ways. The geysers can erupt up to 20 meters high, and the colourful hot springs are caused by minerals in the water. Rotorua is also an important centre of Māori culture.

Challenge: You are a scientist discovering a new geyser. Using household items or simple props, create a mini “geyser experiment”.

Example: Use a small bottle, baking soda, and vinegar to make a mini eruption.

Give your geyser a funny or magical name.

Bonus: Observe what happens and explain aloud to a friend or family member how the eruption works.



Landmark 9

Bay of Islands (Northland)

About: The Bay of Islands has 144 islands, sandy beaches, and rich history. It's known for Māori culture, sailing, and dolphin spotting.

Challenge: Plan a treasure hunt on one of the islands. Draw a simple map with a starting point, path, and “X marks the spot,” then describe one tricky obstacle the adventurer might face (Swinging rope over a creek, patch of quicksand, etc...)



Landmark 5

Cathedral Cove (Coromandel Peninsula)

About: Cathedral Cove has a natural rock arch, white sandy beaches, and clear water. It's only accessible on foot or by kayak, making it a perfect explorer spot.

Challenge: Pretend you're a wildlife photographer. Draw a picture of the animals or birds you might photograph, and write a short "caption" like it would appear in a nature magazine.



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
